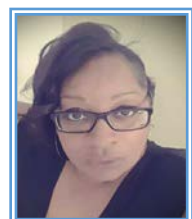

# Joyce Marie Harris

September 14, 1946 ~ December 31, 2020

(age 74)



**Joyce M Harris** was born on September 14, 1946 to the late Clayton B (Buddy) Harris and Luedora Clark in Cleveland, Ohio. Joyce accepted Christ at an early age and was a member of the Faith Gospel Chapel and Elim Gospel Chapel. Joyce was a devout Christian, who lived her life honoring God.

After graduating High School, Joyce went on to receive her Bachelor of Science degree and become a certified Radiology technician. Joyce became the first Black female radiology technician at Cleveland Mt Sinai Hospital, where she worked over 30+ years.

Joyce was an active member of the National Medical Association (NMA). She was a section leader for the Radiology division. She conducted a radiology workshop at the annual conference. She mentored many African American students in the area of medicine. She was working with NMA to bring the annual conference to Cleveland in 2022.

Joyce was very active in the Hough community. As a teen, she witnessed the Hough Riots of 1966 and participated in a documentary about the Riots in 2016. She was a member of the Ward 7 Advisory Board and was actively involved in several large community development projects. She was also active with her block club. She enjoyed spending time with her family and friends, traveling, playing the lottery, and loved the sound of the slot machines.

Joyce was called to eternal rest on December 31, 2020. She will be missed by all who knew her. Joyce leaves to cherish her memory her brother Clayton Jr. "Bobby" a host of beloved nieces, nephews, cousins and lifelong friends.

## OBITUARIES CONTINUED:

### DR. ANDRE GALIBER SR. DEAD AT 72



Prominent Virgin Islands radiologist and physician Dr. Andre Galiber Sr. died Sunday in his home on St. Croix, surrounded by his family. Galiber had fought a 10-year battle with prostate cancer. A funeral service is scheduled for 9:30 a.m. Saturday at the Holy Cross Church in Christiansted. Burial will follow at the Christiansted cemetery. Galiber, who was born and raised on St. Thomas, had devoted his life to the territory. In June, the Radiology and Cardiovascular Laboratory Department at Juan F. Luis Hospital was dedicated to Galiber in honor of his many contributions to the unit, the hospital and the territory. On the memorial plaque, Francis M. Molloy, chairman of the Juan F. Luis Hospital Board, wrote the "unit is dedicated to recognize his (Galiber's) significant contributions to diagnostic imaging." On Aug. 5, Dr. Galiber celebrated his 72nd birthday and a month later, on Sept. 7, his 44th wedding anniversary, which was celebrated with his wife, Edith Rose Lewis Galiber, at his bedside. His daughter, Cecile deJongh, said, "He was our hero. For all of us he was our inspiration. He

pushed us to succeed. Failure was never an option." After graduating from Howard University in 1957 with his medical degree, he completed his internship and initial residency at Freedman's Hospital in Washington, D.C. In 1963, Galiber became the first black physician to complete a residency at Indiana University. The same year he became the first full-time, board-certified V.I. radiologist and he was the only Virgin Islands fellow of the American College of Radiology. Galiber was the director of the Charles Harwood Hospital radiology department in the 1960s and '70s and then of the radiology department at what was then St. Croix Hospital (now Luis Hospital) until his retirement in 1984. After his retirement he continued to serve as a volunteer radiology consultant at the hospital. He was a founding member of the Island Medical Center, established in 1974. In 1986, Galiber was the Virgin Islands Medical Society's distinguished physician and was a 1999 American Cancer Society honoree. He was a mentor and employer of many students pursuing health science careers, according to his son, Dr. Angelo Galiber, one of three of seven children who chose to become physicians. All three practice medicine on St. Croix. Since 1963, the senior Galiber had served as president, executive secretary, treasurer, National Medical Association delegate and American Medical Association delegate of the Virgin Islands Medical Society. He was also a president of the St. Croix Hospital Medical Staff. Another significant contribution was his leadership in Continuing Medical Education. He presented, coordinated and/or monitored several seminars for peers and nursing professionals, Angelo Galiber said. Andre Galiber Sr. provided professional ultrasound experience and most of the technical training during the first 10 years of ultrasound services at Luis Hospital. He is survived by his wife, Edith Rose Lewis-Galiber, and his seven children: Lorraine Gundel, Dr. Andre Galiber Jr., Dr. Angelo Galiber, Lisa Forgeron, Cecile de Jongh, Dr. Dante Galiber and Marcel Galiber. He is also survived by siblings Dr. Flavius Galiber Sr., Rudolph Galiber, Doris Roberts, Gerda Galiber, Norma Bingham, and Lt. Col. (Ret.) Leayale Galiber. Galiber has 15 grandchildren: Tiphannie and Zachary Gundel, Amanda Galiber, Angelo II, Nicole and William Galiber, Isla and Che Vanterpool, John III, Rene and Julian de Jongh, Dominique Galiber, Marcel II, Chelsea and Javier Galiber. Also surviving him are his in-laws Henna Roebuck-Galiber, Yvonne Ashley-Galiber, Wilma Belardo-Galiber, Mark Forgeron and John de Jongh, Jr. Dr. Galiber survived his parents Adele Lanclos-Galiber and Henry Galiber. In lieu of flowers, the family asks that donations be made to the Holy Cross Catholic Church on St. Croix and the St. Croix chapter of the American Cancer Society.

## FIRST AFRICAN AMERICAN ELECTED PRESIDENT OF THE ACR

**Dr. Beverly Coleman**, Chief of the Division of Fetal Imaging in the Department of Radiology at Children’s Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) has been elected as **President of the American College of Radiology (ACR)**. Dr. Coleman has been a long-time member of the American College of Radiology, providing experience and perspective in the field of ultrasound. Dr. Coleman’s election to the top leadership position of ACR is a historic milestone as she is the first African American elected to the Presidency in the College’s 93 year history.

Dr. Coleman received her medical degree from Harvard University in 1974. She completed a radiology residency in 1977 and a fellowship in abdominal imaging in 1978, both at the University of Pennsylvania. This was the beginning of Dr. Coleman’s long and illustrious career in Radiology. She worked as an attending radiologist in the Department of Radiology at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania for over 35 years, serving in a variety of leadership roles. Dr. Coleman was the Director of Ultrasound Imaging at the University of Pennsylvania Medical Center from 1993-2014, as well as the Associate Chairman of the Abdominal Imaging Division from 2000-2014, where she oversaw ultrasound, magnetic resonance imaging, body computed tomography, and gastrointestinal and genitourinary radiology. From 1993-2009, she served as the Director of the Abdominal Imaging Fellowship Program. As an Emeritus Professor of the University of Pennsylvania, Dr. Coleman was appointed as the Director of the Division of Fetal Imaging at CHOP in 2013, where she continues to focus on obstetrical ultrasound with a special devotion to unraveling the mysteries of prenatal diagnosis of fetal anomalies. She has been an integral part of the Center for Fetal Diagnosis and Treatment (CFDT) for over two decades. She is the inaugural holder of the Endowed Chair in Fetal Imaging, which she received in 2016. Dr. Coleman has been past president of numerous radiology societies, locally, the Philadelphia Roentgen Ray Society and regionally, the Pennsylvania Radiological Society and was elected the honored radiologist for both societies. Nationally, Dr. Coleman was elected to the presidency of the Society of Radiologists in Ultrasound and the National Medical Association Section on Radiology and Radiation Oncology. Dr. Coleman has won many awards for her extraordinary achievements, including the Lifetime Service Award from the American Board of Radiology in 2015 and the Distinguished Service Award from the Society of Radiologists in Ultrasound in 2018.

Dr. Coleman has been a prominent figure in various organizations throughout her career, including being elected to fellowship in the American College of Radiology, the American Institute of Ultrasound in Medicine, the Society of Radiologists in Ultrasound, and the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Philadelphia. Dr. Coleman has over 250 publications and has given over 500 lectures nationally and internationally.

## SRRO FACULTY SPOTLIGHT

Andrea A. Birch, M.D., FACR

Professor of Clinical Radiology and Radiological Sciences

Department of Radiology and Radiological Sciences

Vanderbilt University Medical Center

Pursuing excellence in patient care and in teaching, Dr. Andrea Birch currently serves as Professor of Clinical Radiology and Radiological Sciences, Department of Radiology and Radiological Sciences (RRS), Vanderbilt University Medical Center (VUMC). She is also Director of Diagnostic Radiology RAD:5710, a 4-week elective for visiting medical students. She is highly regarded for her outstanding clinical expertise in Breast Imaging, her competency at passing on this knowledge as an instructor and mentor, her knack for establishing positive relationships with her patients, and her work to increase the number of under-represented minorities and women in the field of Radiology.

Dr. Birch is an able and experienced instructor, having also served as Associate Professor, Department of Diagnostic Radiology, at University of Tennessee Health Sciences Center (UT). Under her tutelage, trainees learn to evaluate image quality, consider relevant data, perform minimally invasive breast procedures, establish positive doctor-patient relationships, identify pertinent findings, generate differential diagnoses, utilize the breast lexicon and apply appropriate algorithms -- all leading to evidenced based interpretations and recommendations that help achieve optimal outcomes. She also challenges her trainees to cultivate a desire for lifelong learning and personal career development.

Consistent with her longstanding commitment to increase URM and female representation in radiology, she is Director of the RRS Office for Diversity and Inclusion. Her leadership contributed to the increase in enrollment of URM and women in the RRS's Diagnostic and Interventional Radiology programs from 8% to 20%, twice the national average. She is responsible for the annual VUMC Radiology Diversity Lectureship, featuring nationally recognized speakers.

Dr. Birch also educates medical and college students about radiology, provides them "shadowing" experiences, reviews their personal statements for residency and medical school applications and is founder and faculty advisor of VUMC's RAD-AID Chapter. She is also recognized for her diversity and inclusion work nationally, currently serving on the steering committee of the Pipeline Initiative for the Enrichment of Radiology (PIER) of the American College of Radiology (ACR) for which she created a presentation introducing radiology for medical students shown at ACR workshops across the country and formerly serving as a preceptor for the Nth Dimensions pipeline program.

Dr. Birch's experience as a clinician is also exemplary. At UT Memphis, in private practice as a partner in Radiology Alliance, Tennessee's largest private imaging and radiology group and now at VUMC, she has evaluated thousands of patients. She treats all with compassion and provides the information they need to make informed decisions about their healthcare. She blogs about women's breast health and often speaks about mammography at health fairs and to women's and church groups, motivating many women to be screened.

Dr. Birch has received numerous awards and accolades, including the Vanderbilt Breast Center Award of Excellence, RRS Senior Resident Attending of the Year and Spelman College Health Careers Distinguished Alumna. She is a member of many professional organizations including the ACR (Committee on Women and Diversity; Independent PIER Internship Oversight Task Force), the Society of Breast Imaging and the Tennessee Radiological Society (Women and Diversity Ad Hoc Committee Chair and Councilor). She also serves on the Board of Directors of Susan G. Komen Central Tennessee and is chair of its Grants Committee.

Dr. Birch graduated from Spelman College and Meharry Medical College and is licensed to practice medicine in Tennessee. She completed her internship and residency at St. Francis Medical Center. (now University of Pittsburgh) and completed a fellowship in Ultrasound at the University of Tennessee Health Sciences Center. She is certified by the National Board of Medical Examiners and in Diagnostic Radiology by the American Board of Radiology.

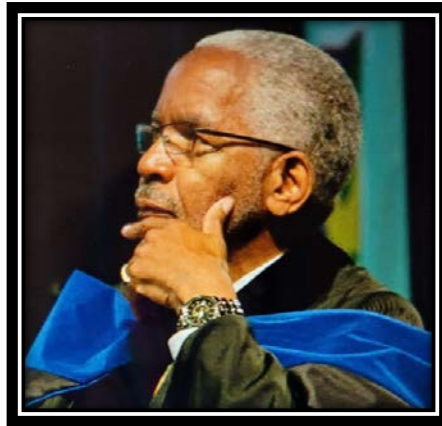
### Daniel Bradley, MD

## Keeping the Conversation Going

A civil rights activist encourages continued dialogue as radiology addresses It's lack of underrepresented minority physicians.

As the U.S. reckons with its racial inequality of the past and present, the ACR is exploring how it can leverage its own advocacy network to create a future of healthcare equity. The Bulletin talked with Henry W. Wiggins Jr., MD, a Black radiologist and civil rights activist, about his early experiences in the profession.

### HOW DID YOU GET YOUR START IN RADIOLOGY?

I remember being a high school senior in Clearfield, Pennsylvania, in 1951, when my entire class got to go to Washington, D.C., but I couldn't go because restaurants and hotels in Washington D.C., at that time, refused to serve Black Americans. I was the only Black intern at University Hospital, Iowa City, from 1959–1960. I was an internal medicine resident from 1960–1961 and a radiology resident from 1961–1964. When I was at Michael Reese Hospital in Chicago from 1964–1966, I was the only Black radiologist on staff.

I was drafted into the U.S. Navy and relocated with my family to serve at the San Diego Naval hospital as Lieutenant Commander during the Vietnam War from 1966–1968. During the first few months, I made several calls to look at available housing — only to be told that nothing was available when I showed up in person. This obvious racism affected my ability to do my job and the well-being of my family.

Later, I was transferred to Bremerton Naval Hospital in Washington. When I arrived at the hospital for the first time, I was mistaken for Dr. Bryant, the other Black physician on staff, which was bittersweet. On the one hand, it was disheartening to be mistaken for another Black doctor. On the other hand, I was glad that for once I wasn't going to be the only one on staff.

### IN YOUR 1965 POSTSCRIPT ESSAY, "FREEDOM: SPIRIT OF THE SELMA MARCH," YOU WROTE ABOUT YOUR PARTICIPATION IN THE MARCH FROM SELMA TO MONTGOMERY. HOW DID THIS EXPERIENCE CHANGE YOU?

Being around other people who were doing the same thing, for the same reasons I was, ignited a new chapter in my life. There weren't only Black folks there — there were people of all races, from all over the country. I discovered that the reasons I was marching were relevant and important to a broad spectrum of people — not just to me and my community. That's why I also participated in the Million Man March in Washington, D.C., in 1995.

#### HOW DO RACIAL DISPARITIES IN HEALTHCARE CONTINUE TO BE A PUBLIC HEALTH CRISIS FOR BLACK COMMUNITIES?

There is a shortage of Black physicians. For Black families, this may mean that they can't see a physician they feel comfortable with or who understands their culture. But disparities in healthcare don't just affect Black communities. They affect Native Americans, Latinxs/Hispanics, people from different socioeconomic groups — everyone who lacks representation in the profession.

#### WHY DO YOU THINK RADIOLOGY LAGS BEHIND OTHER MEDICAL SPECIALTIES IN ITS PERCENTAGE OF BLACK PHYSICIANS?

Medicine in general lacks representation of Black physicians, not just the field of radiology. And one can't talk about this without considering the effects of the Flexner Report of 1910, a landmark study of medical education in the U.S. and Canada.

The medical school closures that occurred as a result of this report disproportionately affected schools at Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). Of the seven medical schools at HBCUs, five were closed. Because of widespread admissions discrimination at the time, it was almost impossible for aspiring Black medical students to study anywhere else.

During the '50s and '60s, plenty of Black students applied at all medical schools, not just the ones at HBCUs. They just weren't being accepted. It became commonly known in the community that we weren't being accepted elsewhere. Looking back, I knew very few Black physicians who studied at other medical schools. The resulting shortage of Black physicians continues today and extends to radiology.

#### MEDICINE IN GENERAL LACKS REPRESENTATION OF BLACK PHYSICIANS, NOT JUST THE FIELD OF RADIOLOGY.

ALTHOUGH THE OVERALL NUMBER OF BLACK MALE COLLEGE GRADUATES HAS INCREASED, THE NUMBER OF BLACK MALE MEDICAL STUDENTS HAS ACTUALLY DECREASED SINCE 1978. WHY DO YOU THINK THIS IS?

I think there are a lot of factors involved in decreased enrollment. Cost is one of them. Lack of representation in medicine is another, because many college students won't choose to study something in which they don't see themselves represented.

The National Medical Association (NMA) was created in 1895 to serve Black physicians who were not permitted to join the AMA at that time. I used to do recruitment tours on behalf of the NMA to help spark interest in a medical career among students of color.

I also used to host the NMA section at RSNA, with Black radiologists, residents, and medical students in attendance. That proved to be a good venue for recruiting Black medical students into radiology.

Targeted radiology internships and mentorship programs are also a way to attract more URM physicians to radiology. It may be beneficial to expose students of color to careers in medicine at an even earlier age — in high school or middle school.

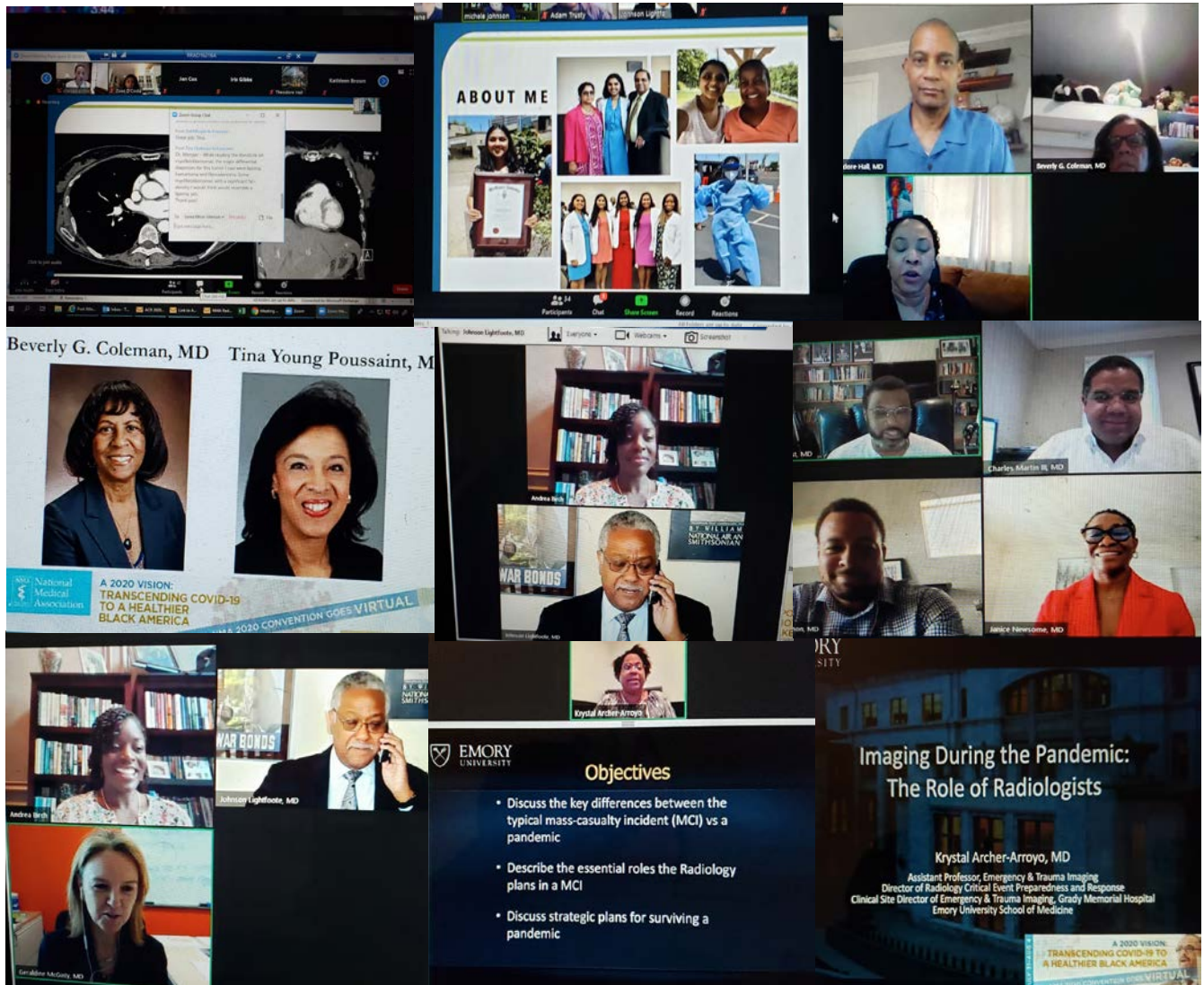
#### HOW MIGHT THE RADIOLOGY COMMUNITY ADDRESS AND ELIMINATE IMPLICIT BIAS?

Implicit bias needs to be discussed more often — in our CME, at our conferences — to the point where everyone is aware of their own biases. We all have them.

Medical students need training, and early, about what implicit bias is, how to recognize and challenge their own biases, and how to ensure those biases don't spill over into their practices. In patient care situations, this is critical, and sometimes it is literally a matter of life or death. While I don't have concrete solutions for inclusion, what I do know is that we as a profession have to talk about it. Hopefully, conversation will lead to action that improves health equity and representation within our field, to the benefit of the patients we serve.
